#### **Theme: Quality Education**

The efforts of Universities also lack focus and remain unsystematic. This session focuses on identifying ways of moving away from quantity to quality of education at all levels and for all peoples.

#### Theme: Gender Equality

The aim of SDG 5 is to "achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls". India has made progress over the last decade. In education, there is some parity between females and males in primary, secondary and tertiary education, but there are several areas like political leadership where women still lag behind. Growing violence against women and girls both in the private and public spheres, remains a concern. This session focuses on the complexity of issues impacting the lives of women and ways to overcome these and empower them. It will also focus on the role Universities can play in addressing these issues.

The bottom percentile of the income earners need to be empowered in ways that they could not only improve their incomes but also, their social position in society, especially in a country where sizeable numbers are living below poverty levels, belonging to ST and SC groups. The focus of this session is to identify whether universities are preparing citizens for the future for a world that is more equal.
